
Happy Thanksgiving!



On Sunday, Oct. 23, Holly Mergenhagen, from the Community Foundation for Greater Buffalo [CFGB] presented the idea of setting up a legacy fund (i.e. an endowment) for the church. The Niagara Area Foundation [NAF] is a division of the CFGB specifically set up to empower Niagara County non-profits through financial gifts. A Community Foundation acts as a pass through for the agencies. By pooling our money together we can get better investment opportunities thus, a bigger bang for our buck.

The Finance Committee has been talking about this as a way in which people could give money from their estate, or before, to ensure that a Unitarian Universalist presence remains in Niagara Falls. Holly left printed material which will be shared with any interested party. This differs from an annual donation in that this money is invested and left to grow until the congregation determines a need; thus making it last longer and to be there when needed.

If we set up a legacy fund with the NAF, we set the rules so that it can be removed at any time and put elsewhere if that is the wish of the congregation. Speak to the treasurer, Peter Diachun, if you have questions, concerns or wish to vote on setting up such a fund.
