I was examining some old readings I have enjoyed. One was "a boring night at home" by Gerda Weismann Klein. Mrs. Klein is a Holocaust survivor, former Buffalo resident and editor of the former children's page of the Buffalo News, author, activist and a global ambassador for peace. Her book chronicles life prior to the Nazi occupation of her homeland and her internment in a concentration camp. In her acceptance speech for the Oscar she won for the documentation of her life, she said "I lived a life where winning was getting a crust of bread to eat and to live another day" "your realization of your freedom honors their memory" In these dark and sun challenged days, we may forget the freedoms we have. We may take for granted the abilities that our foremothers and forefathers created for us. Our UU forefather, James Luther Adams wrote "When the enemies of freedom come to "rescue" us from the regnant social chaos, they will not come wearing brown shirts and hailing Der Fuehrer; they will come waving our flag and clutching the bible-seemingly innocent symbols of American culture". You can read more about JLA's prophetic voice and foreshadowing of our current state in the past UUA World, Winter edition 2010, article "Did James Luther Adams really predict 'Christian Fascists'?" Like Mrs. Klein's call to awareness of freedom, JLA cautions us to be stronger UU's. He states "The trouble with being a Unitarian is often not the power of our enemies, but our own weakness, our liberal laxity"

Our freedom not only grants but also obligates us as Americans to be strong for those who would be oppressed. Our UU faith compels this.

Unfortunately, we've been there before. Because of that, let's remind ourselves that **we** can still be kind. We can still hold onto our Seven Principles and Sources of the Living Traditions.

For now, though, things seem so wrong and overwhelming. FUUN can help.

If you haven't been able to attend First UU church services, consider coming back. We are a welcoming congregation of liberal faiths. It just feels more comfortable to be around those who think-alike sometimes. At FUUN, we have benefitted from having a venue where we can be heard, even if our views don't match another person's thinking. So, at coffee hours, church talk backs and simply being there to hear the ideas expressed by our speakers, the opportunity is there for anyone to experience.

The FUUN Caring Circle, consisting of Judi Bongiovanni, Shelley Baxter, Peter Diachun, Marge Gillies and Susan Frawley, would like to know of any concerns you have. We can't solve all the problems in the world, but *we can listen*. When requested, we may have some suggestions to offer as well. Feel free to contact any one of us.

Another way to get past a difficult time is just to have fun. The Caring Circle set up a game day to just play a board game after church. It's a blast that will likely take away your cares for an hour or so.

You might also consider working this Saturday, December 3rd from 9:30 to noon to decorate the church. During the weeks of advent, please bring plastic wrapped toilet paper rolls for those who are homeless or on social services. It isn't an easy life when one is in need of public assistance. Monies for rent go right to the owners. Food stamps may help, but often average about \$4 per day. Toiletries, paper products, and other non-food items are not included and small amounts of cash can be used to purchase such items.

Documentation and certification of clients is an on-going, often frustrating process. You can help by bringing at least one roll of toilet paper roll in a plastic bag for each week of Advent. This year our donation will be given to Heart, Love and Soul.

I know the holidays are difficult for us - so many unresolved issues pop up at these times. You are not alone. Please join us whenever you can. FUUN is always better when you can make it. I can't wait to see you again!


