President's Message

A lot of ideas come to me when I am out running. There is a megachurch not even a mile from my home that I run past several times a week. A few weeks ago, a sign appeared in front of the church that stuck in my head. It bothered me. It said, "Looking to win this summer? SUMMER OF ONE (with the one crossed out and replaced by WON). Win friends. Win battles. Win Opportunities." The first time I ran past it, I did not really think about it much, except that I thought it a strange sign for a church. Each time I passed it, it bothered me more and more. When did religion get to be all about the individual and winning? What happened to the greater good and the golden rule? What happened to community? This sign did not convey to me what I thought religion was all about. And then I forgot about the sign.



That is, until I presented the first summer service on June 24th. There, I discussed what brought me to Unitarian Universalism. In the religion I had been raised in, church was church and had nothing to do with one's daily lives. I loved the mystery and pageantry and ritual-but I also saw that the people who were the most "religious" did not practice their faith in their interactions with others. In the UU tradition, we are called to take our seven

principles into the world and live them. In my presentation, I said that I felt we were led more by reason and thought than by being "moved by the spirit" as happens in other religions, and that we did not have a lot of rituals to bring us to a spirit of worship. And perhaps that is why our church remains small. But there is one ritual that every UU church shares - lighting the chalice. The flaming chalice is the symbol of our faith in action. Here is a blurb from the UUA website.

"The chalice and the flame were brought together as a Unitarian symbol by an Austrian artist, Hans Deutsch, in 1941. Living in Paris during the 1930s, Deutsch drew critical cartoons of Adolf Hitler. When the Nazis invaded Paris in 1940, he abandoned all he had and fled to the South of France, then to Spain, and finally, with an altered passport, into Portugal.

There, he met the Reverend Charles Joy, executive director of the Unitarian Service Committee (USC). The Service Committee was new, founded in Boston to assist Eastern Europeans, among them Unitarians as well as Jews, who needed to escape Nazi persecution. From his Lisbon headquarters, Joy oversaw a secret network of couriers and agents.

Deutsch was most impressed and soon was working for the USC. He later wrote to Joy:

There is something that urges me to tell you... how much I admire your utter self denial [and] readiness to serve, to sacrifice all, your time, your health, your well being, to help, help.

I am not what you may actually call a believer. But if your kind of life is the profession of your faith—as it is, I feel sure—then religion, ceasing to be magic and mysticism, becomes confession to practical philosophy and—what is more—to active, really useful social work. And this religion—with or without a heading—is one to which even a 'godless' fellow like myself can say wholeheartedly, Yes!

The USC was an unknown organization in 1941. This was a special handicap in the cloak-and-dagger world, where establishing trust quickly across barriers of language, nationality, and faith could mean life instead of death. Disguises, signs and countersigns, and midnight runs across guarded borders were the means of freedom in those days. Joy asked Deutsch to create a symbol for their papers "to make them look official, to give dignity and importance to them, and at the same time to symbolize the spirit of our work.... When a document may keep a man out of jail, give him standing with governments and police, it is important that it look important."

Thus, Hans Deutsch made his lasting contribution to the USC and, as it turned out, to Unitarian Universalism. With pencil and ink he drew a chalice with a flame. "

So, every time we light and extinguish the chalice, I think of why it was created and I am reminded that I should take that light out into the world. And while I was working on my presentation, I realized why that sign in front of the church I pass when I run bothered me so. It implied that winning and the individual are what is important, not the community nor the greater good. At the service, I was so heartened to hear everyone wanting to do something for the immigrant children taken from their parents. I was thinking that we should start a letter writing campaign to our elected officials for the things we believe in as a church community, and then, at the July 1st service, I met a young couple visiting from Virginia. They told me about Advocacy Corps, a subset of UUs for Social Justice and the Write Here! Write Now! Program. Many of us would like to do something about causes we care about, but feel we are just one person. Erica and Robert Steele said that a hand written letter from one of their constituents is given careful attention by your senator or representative. And that Advocacy Corps actually hand delivers these letters to your congressman or senator. Check out the Unitarian Universalists for Social Justice online. This is a way for those of us who cannot get out and attend rallies and protests to have a voice. This is a way to light our chalice out in the world and let that light shine and illuminate our community.


